Research estimates that 1% of the population, which would be 4,000 people in Genesee County, are living with Celiac Disease. Of those 4,000 people, it is estimated that almost 3,000 of them are undiagnosed. Recent findings show that this disease is on the rise, across all ethnicities, and cases are more often presenting with non-gastrointestinal symptoms. In fact, Celiac Disease has over 300 associated symptoms, many of which are not abdominally related. Some include:

- infertility and miscarriage
- anxiety and depression
- dental enamel defects
- anemia
- hair loss
- osteopenia/ osteoporosis

- * Lactose Intolerance
- * kidney stones
- * Turner Syndrome
- * obesity
- * peripheral neuropathy
- * migraines
