A diagnosis of cancer is the beginning of a fight – something that takes not only advanced medicine, but also the strength of patients and their families to win.

Too often, financial struggles such as loss of income, transportation costs, etc. can impact treatment. Experts call this *"financial toxicity"* and the accompanying stress is a significant and real deterrent to cancer survival.



However, through the efforts a local family, help is available.

The Betty Kearns Little Black Dress Event was established the year after Betty Kearns lost her battle with breast cancer in 2006. The family, looking for a way to honor their beloved matriarch, established the fundraiser as a reminder of Betty and her husband Ted's love of dancing, with Betty in her little black dress. Those funds supported breast cancer programs in Port Huron.

In July 2016, the Betty Kearns Cancer Fund was established through the McLaren Port Huron Foundation to help ease some of the financial struggles of patients receiving treatment for any type of cancer at McLaren Port Huron's Karmanos Cancer Institute. The family works with the hospital's oncology staff to identify those needing help.

McLaren Port Huron Foundation Director Lynn Griffor recalls the fund helping a family who, through loss of income due to cancer, was facing foreclosure.

"The patient was more worried about his wife and family losing their house than he was about surviving," says Lynn. "The fund helped this family keep everything together during his treatment."

The fund also has a grateful oncology staff behind it as it gives them another tool in the treatment process.

"I've seen oncology staff in tears because they are so grateful they can provide this kind of resource to impact lives," added Lynn.

Betty Kearns' granddaughter, Debbie Reynolds, says her soft-spoken grandmother would be humbled, and a little embarrassed at the thought of the fund in her name. Lifelong residents, Betty and her husband Ted, raised nine children in Port Huron.

Although Betty was a modest woman, Debbie says she would be proud the fund is helping the community that she loved so much.
